Subject: Mandatory Rule Review Written Comment Period for the Election Rules (8 CCR 1505-1)

My comments are on section 2.4. As written I believe it leaves room for fraudulent voter registrations to be processed. In light of undercover videos posted by project veritas, where top democrats associated with both the DNC and the Hillary campaign bragged that "they've been bussing people in for 50 years, and they're not gonna stop, but just figure out a different way

I think absolutely we need to do more to verify citizenship as well as residency for not only new registrants, but also existing registrants.

For new registrants, I fully believe that an incomplete registration, in any form should be treated as incomplete, particularly section 2.4.1, underlined below where the citizenship question is not answered, regardless if the rest of the registration is filled in. Incomplete is incomplete, and citizens should not have to worry that non-citizens are cancelling out their votes, because of a loophole allowing noncitizens to register and cast votes in our elections.

Also in section 2.4.2, also underlined below, how many drivers licenses were issue illegal immigrants without the notation that their ID was ineligible for voting purposes? Even 1 is too many, so again I'll reiterate that incomplete is incomplete, and registrations missing identification information, even if a photocopy of an ID is presented, should be treated as incomplete.

2.4 Treatment of incomplete new registration applications

2.4.1 If an applicant fails to check the box answering the question, "Are you a citizen of the United States?", the county clerk must accept and process the application as complete so long as it is otherwise complete and the affirmation at the bottom of the form is signed.

2.4.2 If an applicant fails to complete the required identification portion of the form in accordance with sections 1-2-204(2)(f.5) and (3)(c), C.R.S., the county clerk must treat the application as incomplete. But if the applicant submits a photocopy of his or her driver's license or identification card, the county clerk must enter the ID number from the card into the applicant's record and process the application as complete.

2.4.3 If an applicant fails to provide a date of birth, the county clerk must treat the application as incomplete. But if the applicant submits a photocopy of his or her driver's license or other approved form of ID that includes the date of birth, the county clerk must enter that

information into the applicant's record and process the application as complete.
