In order to qualify for an annual low-income Colorado State Wildlife Area Pass an individual must show a photo identification card and:

Provide written proof, in the form of a federal or state income tax return from the immediately preceding calendar year, that the federal taxable income of such individual is at or below one hundred percent of the official poverty line for an individual or a family, as appropriate to the applicant. If said tax return is not available, a return for the year immediately preceding such year shall suffice. Or,

If an individual's income is at a level where such individual is not required to file an income tax return, such individual shall sign a statement under penalty of perjury in the second degree to such effect. No such affidavit shall be required to be notarized. Or,

A Colorado resident may provide documentation in the form of a card or other verifiable written materials that the resident is currently enrolled in any one of the following programs: TANF (Temporary Assistance to Needy Families), WIC (Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children), Health First Colorado (Colorado's Medicaid program), SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program), FDPIR (Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations), or LEAP (Low-income Energy Assistance Program).

The federal taxable income amounts, based on the number of people in the family/household, cannot be greater than the applicable guideline set forth in the Annual Update of the HHS Poverty Guidelines, 89 Fed. Reg. 2961 (January 17, 2024) issued by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Office of the Assistant Secretary for Planning and Evaluation, Room 404E, Humphrey Building, Department of Health and Human Services, Washington, DC 20201. Basis and Purpose
Chapter W-0 - General Provisions

Basis and Purpose:

Effective July 1, 2024, the United States Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) intends to implement the Duck Stamp Modernization Act of 2023 (Act). The Act contains two major feature changes: 1) an Electronic Duck Stamp shall remain valid from the day it is sold through the following June 30th, instead of being valid for 45 days from the day of sale; and, 2) that the Secretary shall issue to each individual who purchases an Electronic Duck Stamp an actual Duck Stamp. In addition to these changes the FWS also approved a \$2.00 increase to the fulfillment convince fee due to rising postal costs beginning August 1, 2024. When that happens, Colorado Parks and Wildlife (CPW) will be required to remit \$29.00 to Amplex (for the FWS) for each electronic Federal Duck Stamp sold.

Prior to this change CPW charged \$31.00 for a Federal Duck Stamp. From that fee, \$25.00 went to the fee set by FWS for the stamp, \$2.00 went to Amplex for fulfillment, \$3.00 would cover CPW agency costs, and the remaining \$1.00 would go towards the North American Waterfowl Conservation Act (NAWCA). Beginning August 1, 2024 the Amplex fulfillment fee will increase from \$2.00 to \$4.00. When this happens, CPW will no longer make enough money to cover our agency administrative costs or contribute to the NAWCA. By updating, the price charged for the Federal Duck Stamp to be \$33.00 CPW will be able to cover its administrative costs as well as continue contributing to the NAWCA.

The state Administrative Procedures Act enables the Commission to pass emergency rules without notice where it “finds that immediate adoption of the rule is imperatively necessary to comply with a state or federal law or federal regulation or for the preservation of public health, safety, or welfare and compliance with the requirements of [the APA notice provisions] would be contrary to the public interest and makes such a finding on the record.” § 24-4-103(6)(a), C.R.S. The Commission finds and concludes that such requirements are satisfied here. The emergency rule amendment is necessary to comply with federal law while maintaining agency finances and contributions to NAWCA.

EFFECTIVE DATE - THESE EMERGENCY REGULATIONS SHALL BECOME EFFECTIVE IMMEDIATELY UPON ADOPTION AND SHALL REMAIN IN EFFECT FOR NO MORE THAN 120 DAYS OR UNTIL PERMANENT REGULATIONS TAKE EFFECT, WHICHEVER OCCURS FIRST, OR THE EMERGENCY REGULATIONS ARE OTHERWISE REPEALED, AMENDED, OR SUPERSEDED.
