Definitions of Key Terms

Election cycle:

- Candidate / Candidate committees: Starts the thirty-first day after a general election for a specific office and ends thirty days after the next general election for that office. (Article XXVIII, Section 2(6) of the Colorado Constitution)
- Issue committees: Based on a calendar year January 1st through December 31st. (Campaign and Political Finance Rule 4.5)

Unexpended campaign contributions

 Funds on hand in any candidate committee at the end of an election cycle, less the amount of all unpaid monetary obligations incurred prior to the election in furtherance of such candidacy. (Article XXVIII, Section 2(15) of the Colorado Constitution)



Definitions of Key Terms

- Campaign and Political Finance Rule 10.1 further defines Unexpended campaign contributions:
 - Candidate committees: funds at the end of the election cycle or when a candidate withdraws from the political race and intends to terminate his or her candidate committee.
 - Issue committees: contributions to an issue committee become unexpended contributions at the end of the election cycle in which the committee supported or opposed a ballot measure, or one that attempted access to the ballot. Funds do not become unexpended contributions if the issue committee supports or opposes, or intends to support or oppose, another ballot measure or measures.

Candidate Committees Unexpended Campaign Contributions

What can a candidate committee do with their unexpended funds?

Candidate Committees (1-45-106(1), C.R.S.)

Reimburse candidate for their expenditures

Note: This includes reasonable and necessary expenses for the care of children or other dependents the candidate incurs directly in connection with the candidate's campaign activities.

Retain for use in a subsequent campaign/election (subject to limitations - see CPF Rule 2.2.4)

Contributed to a candidate committee established by the same candidate for a different public office (subject to the limitations – see CPF Rule 2.2.4)

Contribute to the political party (subject to contribution limits – see CPF Rule 10.17)

Return to contributors

Donate to a charitable organization recognized by the IRS

Candidate Committees - Continued Unexpended Campaign Contributions

What can a candidate committee do with their unexpended funds?

Candidate Committees (1-45-106(1), C.R.S.) – A person elected to a public office may also use unexpended campaign contributions for:

Voter registration

Political issue education, which includes obtaining information from or providing information to the electorate

Postsecondary educational scholarships

Defraying reasonable and necessary expenses related to mailings and similar communications to constituents

Any expenses that are directly related to such person's official duties as an elected official, including, but not limited to, expenses for the purchase or lease of office equipment and supplies, room rental for public meetings, necessary travel and lodging expenses for legislative education such as seminars, conferences, and meetings on legislative issues, and telephone and pager expenses.



Contribution (Donation) Limits made to a Political Party

Contributors	Limits (are based on a calendar year)
Individual or Political Committee	\$4,025 (State, county, district, & local levels combined of which not more than \$3,350 may be given to the state party)
Candidate Committee	\$4,025 (State, county, district, & local levels combined of which not more than \$3,350 may be given to the state party)
Business Entity (Other than a corporation)	\$4,025 (State, county, district, & local levels combined of which not more than \$3,350 may be given to the state party)
Federal PAC or Federal 527 Political Organizations	\$4,025 (State, county, district, & local levels combined of which not more than \$3,350 may be given to the state party)
Small Donor Committee	\$20,325 (State, county, district, & local levels combined of which not more than \$16,925 may be given to the state party)

Candidate Committees - Continued Unexpended Campaign Contributions

What is a candidate committee NOT allowed do with their unexpended funds?

Use the funds for personal purposes (not reasonably related to supporting the election of the candidate)

Contribute to other candidate committees at any level (local, county, state, or federal)

Issue Committees Unexpended Campaign Contributions

What can an Issue Committee or Small-Scale Issue Committee do with their unexpended funds?

Issue Committees (1-45-106(3), C.R.S.)

Return to contributors

Donate to a charitable organization recognized by the IRS



Other Committees Unexpended Campaign Contributions

What about other committees and unexpended funds?

The law does not define unexpended funds for other types of committees.


When these committees are terminating, we suggest the funds be disbursed with the committee's purpose in mind and use 1-45-106, C.R.S. as a guide.



Termination Report

A termination report closes a committee/party and may only be filed once the committee/party has reached a zerodollar balance, which includes resolving any outstanding loans, penalties, or any other financial obligations.

Also, a termination report is filed using one of the regularly scheduled disclosure reports.

Carryover / Rollover of Candidate Committee Funds

- When a candidate committee reaches the end of an election cycle and decides to remain open, the committee must report its retained balance as the beginning balance in the next election cycle. This balance becomes a political party contribution to the candidate committee for the new election cycle and is thus subject to the applicable political party contribution limit if a limit applies.
- Campaign and Political Finance Rule 2.2.4 allows a candidate committee to carryover / rollover funds in excess of the political party contribution limit; <u>however</u>, the use of those excess funds is restricted to unexpended fund activity as outlined in 1-45-106(1)(b), C.R.S.
- Rule 2.2.4 also requires a candidate committee, to disclose on its first regularly scheduled report in the new election cycle the amount it designated as a political party contribution (for general use in the new election cycle) and the amount designated as "Unexpended Funds", if there are any.

Basic Three steps reporting the Carryover/Rollover

Candidate committees, with their first report in the new election cycle, need to "zero" out it's balance in TRACER and show it coming back in so TRACER can account for the political party contribution and unexpended funds (if there are any).

Three quick steps:

- 1.Enter an itemized expenditure to the committee itself (to zero out the balance),
- 2.Enter an itemized contribution from the political party, and
- 3.If unexpended funds are rolled over, enter an itemized contribution from the committee itself for the amount of the unexpended fund total.



There's more? What else?



Maintenance / Retention of Records

- A committee/party must maintain their records for 180 days after the election, unless a complaint is filed then records must be maintained until final disposition of the complaint.
 - Covered Organization Affirmations must be kept for 1 year from receipt
 - LLC Affirmations must be kept for 1 year from after the election

Registration changes

 Within 10 days of a change the registration must be amended to reflect the change. This includes, but is not limited to, information about the committee's purpose, agents, addresses (physical & mailing), email addresses, etc.



- Are loans any different than donations in termination?
 - A loan(s) from a financial institution may not be forgiven and needs paid back before a termination report may be filed.
 - A loan(s) a candidate makes to their own candidate committee may be paid back to the candidate or the candidate may forgive the loan(s). A loan(s) is converted to a contribution in TRACER when the Forgive button (on the *Loans* tab) is used.
- Can there be expenditures after election day?

Yes.



Why are the transactions I entered into TRACER not showing up on my report?

This happens when the date of the transaction(s) is not within the reporting period of the report being filed.

 How long can one hold funds in a candidate committee account, to use for a future race?

Nine years.

Colorado Revised Statute 1-45-106(1)(a)(III), states:

"A candidate committee for a former officeholder or a person not elected to office shall expend all of the unexpended campaign contributions retained by such candidate committee, for the purposes specified in this subsection (1), no later than nine years from the date such officeholder's term expired or from the date of the election at which such person was a candidate for office, whichever is later."



 If funds are rolled over and then in the future the candidate decides not to run, can the committee be terminated at that time?

Yes. A committee may terminate at anytime so long as there is no:

- outstanding debts,
- obligations,
- penalties, or
- open complaints.
